Statistical Abstract of the United States, The National Data Book (2011); U.S. Department of Commerce, U.S. Bureau of the Census, 130th Edition; Annually. Presents extensive selections of data from many statistical publications, both government and private. Summarizes statistics on the social, political and economic organization of the United States and the Outlying areas.

Guam Consumer Price Index (1st Quarter 2011); Business and Economic Statistics Program, Bureau of Statistics and Plans; Quarterly. Several tables present current information and historical comparisons of the consumer price index.

Guam Export Report (December 2010); Business and Economic Statistics Program, Bureau of Statistics and Plans; Annually.

This pamphlet presents the value of Guam's exported goods by commodity group.

Current Employment Report (September 2010); Bureau of Labor Statistics, Guam Department of Labor; Quarterly. Presents the results of a quarterly sample survey of business establishments. This report includes total employees, average wage, hours worked, and earnings by major industry group.

Consolidated Federal Funds Report, Fiscal Year 2009; Bureau of the Census, U.S. Dept of Commerce; Annually. This report is a presentation of Federal Government expenditures or obligations in state, county and subcountry areas of the United States. Includes the District of Columbia and the U.S. Outlying Areas. Data is available on the Internet.

Federal Aid to States, Fiscal Year 2009; U.S. Census Bureau, U.S. Dept of Commerce; Annually. This report presents Federal Government aid to state and local governments by state and U.S. Outlying Area. Coverage is restricted to Federal Government expenditures for grants to state and local governments for which data are available by state and outlying area.

ECONOMICS

State of the Island Address (2011); Governor of Guam;

Annually. Report on the state of the Territory by the Governor which addresses current issues: economic, demographic, political, environmental, etc.

The Attorney General's Report on the Compact Impact Reporting (Public 29-129); Office of the Attorney General, Department of Law; December 27, 2010. This report consists of two volumes. The report initially is a response to Public Law 29-129 which is specific to initiating any and all necessary legal actions necessary for the recovery of Compact Impact reimbursements due to the Government of Guam from the U.S. Government. The report provides an overall review of the Compact Impact reporting processing. In addition it includes some of the documents reviewed in its preparation.

Business Opportunities in Guam; Guam Economic Development Authority; October 2010. Presents slides presentations outlining Guam's economic performance and activity that provides interested businesses with information on the economic benefits and opportunities of investing in Guam. Includes data on Gross Domestic Product, construction activity, tourism, real estate market, military buildup and infrastructure.

Government of Guam Retirement Fund - Actuarial Valuation; Richard A. Wright, F.S.A. Milliman, Government Retirement Fund; March 2010.

This report presents the financial statements and an overview of the financial activities of the Government of Guam Retirement fund for the fiscal years ending September 30.

North and Central Guam Land Use Plan, Administrative Review Final Draft; ICF International, Bureau of Statistics and Plans, Guam Coastal Management Program; September 2009. The Island of Guam is at crossroads in planning for its growth and development. The U.S. Department of Defense in planning a major expansion of its facilities and personnel for all military services branches on Guam. An estimated 40,400 active military personnel and dependents are expected by 2014; comprising a 185% increase over the current 14,200 found on the island. Growth in the military sector will impact private sector economic and residential growth and development. Much of the future growth is expected to occur in the northern and central part of Guam. This report presents the results of public meetings conducted in October 2008, whereas Guam residents participated in public visioning to identify potential policies and changes needed to address future growth.

Federal Transactions for Work Performed in Guam; Guam Economic Development Authority with technical assistance from the Bureau of Statistics and Plans; September 2009. The report analyzes the extent to which businesses participate in federal contract awards for work performed in Guam.

ENVIRONMENT

2010 Storm Water Drainage Master Plan; Parsons Transportation Group Inc., Dept of Public Works; December 2010. This report

documents the methodology of characterizing drainage system improvements, erosion control improvements, and water quality treatment improvements, along with criteria used to evaluate these improvements, the probable costs and available funding. In addition it presents a verifiable and repeatable process for prioritizing projects.

Guam Compensatory Mitigation Policy; Sablan Environmental Inc., Funded in part through the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972, as amended, administered by the Office of Ocean and Coastal Resources Management, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, Guam Coastal Management Program, Bureau of Statistics and Plans, through Grant NA#07NOS4190177; Revised July 2010. The Guam Compensatory Mitigation Policy provides guidance for developing and evaluating aquatic and terrestrial compensatory mitigation proposals. It assists Guam natural resource agencies in issuing permits or reviewing actions under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act (22 GAR Div. 2, Ch 5), the Guam Coastal Management Program Federal Consistency review, Seashore Protection.

Guam National Wildlife Refuge Comprehensive Conservation Plan; U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service; September 2009. This plan sets the management direction for improving fish and wildlife habitat conditions and infrastructure for the Refuge for the next 15 years. The plan provides reasonable, scientifically grounded guidance for improving the Refuge's forest, subterranean, coastal, and marine habitats for the long-term conservation of native plants, animals, and migratory birds. Goals and objectives for the

Guam Refuge are identified. The report also includes the 2006 Cultural Resources Overview and Management Plan and the Draft Brown Treesnake Control Plan, 2009.

LAND

Building Permits and Inspection Annual Report (FY2010); Dept of Public Works; Annually. A statistical report presenting number of building permits issued by village and type of building. Includes total construction cost and permit fees.

TRANSPORTATION

Village Streets Master Plan; Parsons Transportation Group Inc., for the Dept of Public Works; November 2009. The document presents a systematic approach for improving village streets throughout the island of Guam. Report documents the village street roadway network, the methodology of defining roadway deficiencies, the criteria used to evaluate needed roadway improvements, the probable costs of improvements, and available funding.

2030 Guam Transportation Plan (Final); Parsons Brinckerhoff International, Inc.; December 19, 2008. Presents a comprehensive, long-term strategy to improve transportation infrastructure and operations throughout Guam. The plan addresses Guam's anticipated multi modal transportation needs, including roadway, bicycle, pedestrian, and transit facilities.
